

## Anne Kelleher

Anne Kelleher began her legal career a deputy prosecuting attorney with the Nez Perce Tribe in 2013. Anne recognized alternatives to traditional sanctions could be used to reduce recidivism and provide criminal defendants unique opportunities to develop job skills and address barriers to employment. During this time, Anne also worked closely with the local school district to develop and implement an attendance court program to address the high rate of truancy among Native American children on the Nez Perce Tribal Reservation. Anne also enjoyed the opportunity to work closely with the Assistant U.S. Attorney's Office, and was appointed as a Special Assistant U.S. Attorney. After three years with the Tribe, Anne moved to Nez Perce County as one of three felony prosecutors, specializing in drug and property crimes.

As a prosecutor, Anne conducted regular in-service training for officers with whom she worked, focusing on issues of search and seizure, use of force, report writing, and courtroom testimony. Anne developed her approach to working with officers during her 12 year career with the Clearwater County Sheriff's Office, a privilege that provided Anne a broad area of experience in Law Enforcement, Community Engagement, and Training and Mentorship. As a field training officer and supervisor, as well as one of the department's use of force and Taser instructors, Anne was involved in training nearly every deputy who worked for the department during her tenure. Anne also developed a Reserve Academy for community members who were either interested in becoming reserve deputies or just curious about the law and how it was enforced in Clearwater County.

In addition to her Juris Doctor University of Idaho in 2014, Anne also received Bachelors of Arts degrees in Criminal Justice and Sociology and a Master of Arts in Criminal Justice from Washington State University. During her time at Washington State Anne taught several undergraduate classes and worked as the academic adviser for the Criminal Justice Undergraduate program. Additionally, she served as an adjunct professor at Concordia Law and of Criminal Justice at University of Idaho, teaching introduction to Criminal Justice, Criminal Justice Organizations, and Comparative Criminal Justice classes.
