Pam Cammarata continues to follow her heart upon her recent retirement from the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ), after 26 years of federal government service. She passionately works to transform policing through her work with the International Association of Directors of Law Enforcement Standards and Training (IADLEST). Additionally, she served as the Acting Deputy Director, overseeing BJA's Policy Office, responsible for state and local programs across the criminal justice system, to include courts, prosecution, defense and corrections.

Prior to her position at BJA, for 12 years Pam worked at the COPS Office. She served as the Deputy Director of Program Support overseeing the grant monitoring and audit liaison functions; developing and promoting innovative training and technical assistance strategies; and overseeing the design, implementation, assessment and advancement of community policing activities. She also served as the Assistant Director of the Program/Policy Support & Evaluation Division, and as the Chief of Staff for the Director of the COPS Office. Pam served as a social science analyst for two years in the Research Division of DOJ's Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP).

Pam served six years with the Anne Arundel County Police Department, in Maryland, as a civilian police management analyst and accreditation manager.
